

Immovable Jewels

- All are on display whenever
 a Lodge is open.
 - > Tracing Board
 - > Rough Ashlar
 - > Smooth/Perfect Ashlar







Tracing Board

- For the Master to lay lines and draw designs on
- Refers to operative mason,
 when the Master Mason
 would show the work
 required of his men.





Tracing Board

- > Become stylised and there is one for each degree.
- Jointly they are a syllabus
 for Freemasonry, although
 coded through symbolism
 and allegory






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Rough and Smooth Ashlars

The stone hewn out in the quarry is passed to the Entered Apprentice to work, mark and indent on.

- > Working tools: rule, gavel and chisel.
- Duty to prepare it for the hands of the more expert workman.
- The craftsman would be responsible for perfecting the stone for its intended purpose.





Rough Ashlar

Represents man at the start of life, when he has his natural wits, but no learning.

His parents/guardians are
 responsible for educating him so
 that he becomes a fit member of
 civilised society.





Perfect Ashlar

- Represents the ultimate product of this effort.
- It is a stone of true die or square, fit only to be tried by the Square and Compasses.
- Represents a form of perfection that might
 be achieved by a good man in his later years,
 after a life in which has demonstrated
 virtuous and pious behaviour.





Derrick

> Often displayed in conjunction
 with a tripod (Derrick), being held
 by a cord and pulley system and
 attached through a lewis or cramp.


Helps the workman raise the now
 perfected stone, so that it fits into
 its intended place in the structure.





Lewis

- Made of pieces of metal being dovetailed into the stone, forming a cramp which the pulley ropes can be attached.
- > Represents the son of a Mason
- Reminds us of the duties owed by a son to his aged parents, as represented by the perfection of the ashlar.






Above: the steel wedges, spacer, and bolt; below: a cut-away view showing the Lewis in position ready for raising or lowering the stone block.


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
